## Collective Worship Policy

### Introduction

Collective worship is the heartbeat to the daily rhythm of life in our schools, worship offers the children and all in our school an opportunity to consider, familiarise and reflect on the stories of the Christians faith. We come together as an expression of our vision and ethos with the aim to be transformed in our relationships toward one another and the world around us. We warmly invite all members of our school communities to join our worship.

Our collective worship provides children and staff the opportunity to:

- Celebrate and participate in elements of the liturgical church year which includes-
  - Christian seasons and festivals
  - school values
  - personal growth
- Develop an understanding of prayer
- Develop a reflective attitude to life through including time and space for spirituality and deeper questioning
- Experience a variety of styles of worship including prayer
- Participate and respond, through active involvement in the planning, leading and evaluation of worship
- Know they are individually valued, encouraged and affirmed

Worship will reflect aspects of the wider curriculum and in particular will:

- Nurture spiritual growth
- Consider their lives through the lens of our Christian values
- Introduce children to importance of faith in the lives of people today, for example: Gandhi, Mother Theresa, those who serve others in humility
- Encourage children to explore values drawn from other religious traditions
- Reflect on the stories that Jesus told and the life he lived

### The Pattern of Collective Worship

Collective worship takes place in school, in the local church, in their local community and in the outdoors. We follow the seasons and festivals of the Church year alongside other special days of celebration. These always include Harvest, Advent, Christmas, Epiphany tide, Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, Lent, Easter and Pentecost and other important days in the calendar such as the start of a new school year and the Leavers' Service.

## Leading worship

Worship has a variety of leaders from both within school, the local church community and from charities such as Bridgebuilder Trust. Pupils are given opportunities to participate in worship through volunteering information, story-telling, singing and offering prayers.

## Planning Collective Worship

Collective worship is carefully planned to link the content with the children's experience. Leaders plan worship to be relevant to the church season and life in school guided by Roots and Fruits. Throughout their time at our school children will experience a wide variety of worship styles such as dance and drama alongside more traditional elements of worship such as prayer and song.

Prayer is a core part of our worship. It is introduced in different forms including thoughts, words, images and music to invite children to engage. Our prayers are addressed to God reflecting the traditions of the Christian faith recognising that this also includes silence.

We regularly review our worship through discussions with the children, observation and reflection. Our evaluations inform our planning and practice.

## A legal note

By law, Collective Worship must:

- Be provided for every child every day;
- Reflect the school's Trust Deed.

Our policy sets out clearly our aspiration that collective worship will be a valuable and valued experience for all members of our school community whatever their backgrounds and beliefs. It is invitational, inclusive and reflective in nature and never coercive or indoctrinatory.

Parents have a right to withdraw their children from all or any acts of worship. In the first instance we ask parents who may wish to exercise this right to visit school to speak with the Executive Headteacher.

## Monitoring and Evaluation

Monitoring will be completed by Governors and senior leaders to ensure the essence of this policy is delivered consistently and with integrity upholding the vision and values of the federation.
